"The poet John McCrae wrote a poem titled In Flanders Fields. In this poem he writes about his preoccupation with death and how it stands as the transition between the struggle of life and the peace that follows. It is written from the point of view of the dead. It speaks of their sacrifice and serves as their command to the living to press on".

In Flanders Fields

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky

The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below. We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe: To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders fields.

Transition

This week saw the beginning of our Transition Program. Students were looking forward to moving to other classrooms or greeting newcomers to theirs. Many were excited about the impending change whilst others are worried about the 'what if's'. If your child is displaying anxious

behaviours such as emotional outbursts, unusually quiet, anger, worry or have difficulty getting to sleep, please see your classroom teacher. Every effort is made to ensure that every student is well supported whilst transitioning to the next level.

P-4 News

Here are some reminders of strategies and suggestions to best assist your child:

- Talk to them about school rules
- Managing separation anxiety
- Show them that you trust the teacher form an initial relationship with the teacher in front of your child and let them see that you trust this new person.
- Say goodbye properly resist the urge to sneak out of the classroom in the hope that your child might not notice.
- Once you say goodbye leave promptly avoid hanging around but reassure them that you will be picking them up later on.

Hometime

• When it's time to pick them up make sure you arrive early to avoid them being the last child waiting to be collected.

The first few weeks of school

- It's not uncommon for a child to resist going to school in the second week. They might say, 'I've been to school now and I don't need to go back'. The excitement of the first week has worn off, but they still feel nervous.
- As students become older, social anxiety can still be an issue but academic concerns can become a higher priority. Some may worry about whether they can complete the academic requirements. All teachers spend time covering all aspects of transition, including academic expectations. Again, please see your classroom teacher if you have any concerns regarding your child transitioning this term.

With Transition a focus this week, Middle Primary used picture storybooks as mentor texts to encourage students to think about the fragility of the environment and the impact of rubbish, particularly on the fauna of our country.







To encourage deeper thinking about the story, we used De Bono's Thinking Hats to further break apart the different perspectives intended by the author.

Some Tips for Parents of year 10 students going into year 11 VCE in 2019. Transition is easier for some students than for others. Some students take to VCE like ducks to water, for others, the first few months of VCE are a blind panic, as they struggle to keep their head above water as they figure out how to organise their notes, manage their time and structure their own revision. So, what's the reason behind this? What makes some students so much more suited for VCE than others? More importantly, what can you do to ensure that, come the start of year 11, your child is one of the students who thrives?

Encourage Their Independence One of the biggest shocks that students encounter when they start VCE is how independent they are required to be. No longer will teachers walk them through every concept, tell them how to revise for tests, or give exact instructions about what homework needs to be done each week. While your child will still get assigned homework, this constitutes only a small fraction of the total work they need to be doing if they want to achieve good marks; the rest is made up of individual and self-determined study and revision.

Foster A Love Of Reading If your child is going to perform well in VCE, they need to be able to read quickly, efficiently and productively for extended periods of time.

The ability to read well affects basically every subject. All you need to do is ensure that your child regularly has access to books and distraction-free spare time; all they need to do is to read as much and as widely as possible!

Develop Their Organisation Skills As you can imagine, in VCE, the ability to stay organised makes a huge difference when it comes to revision. If your child is prone to losing their schoolwork, forgetting deadlines and keeping their notes in chaotic disarray, then now is the time to start establishing good habits. Encourage them to keep using a planner and develop a logical system for storing and organising their notes.

Encourage Goal Setting Goal setting also allows students to focus on long-term tasks more effectively. Encourage your child to think about what they want to get out of VCE. Is there a course they are particularly passionate about? Is there a dream career they are chasing? The earlier you can encourage your child to step back and think about the big picture, the more motivated they will be once they start year 11.

Year 9 Exams Our year 9 students start their exams the week of Monday the 26th November as well and they too are starting to prepare themselves for revision sessions before these final assessments.

Year 9 B4W Urban Camp Two weeks ago our year 9 students experienced their B4W Urban camp in Melbourne. Their activities ranged from rock climbing, ice skating, visiting the Big Issue Magazine and Chinese museums to going up the Eureka Tower and eating Italian cuisine in an authentic Italian restaurant on Lygon Street.
