#### From the Principal

Dear Parents and Families,

#### Inspiring Examples "I had to be resilient." Kurt Fearnley

There is much to admire about Kurt Fearnley the triple Gold Medallist and recently retired Paralympian. Among the list of Kurt's extraordinary sporting achievements is perhaps the pinnacle of local human endurance – completing the Kokoda Trail. Thousands of people have done it, but as far as I am aware only one person with no legs has crawled the entire length of the Kokoda. Kurt is a renowned wheelchair athlete who took up the sport when he was 14. He grew up in a small town in central New South Wales and the local community ensured he was never left out. From pushing his wheelchair as fast as he could down the grass track at the School Athletics carnival, to pushing his wheelchair the last five kilometres on a flat tyre at the Athens Paralympics to win Gold in the toughest marathon in Paralympics history, Kurt's determination and never-say-die attitude has rewarded him with the highest accolades in disability sport. The following is a quote from Kurt's cousin:



"Kurt was born with a form of spinal bifida, which meant he didn't really develop from the waist down. Growing up in Carcoar (NSW) Kurt's main method of getting around was crawling everywhere. He never liked to miss out on anything even if this meant he had to go under fences, through rivers and up hills to go rabbiting!!! Since Kurt has been competing at an elite level in wheelchair racing his training and lifestyle means he hasn't really been out of his chair a lot- so as you can imagine crawling the track is an incredibly hard task. Kurt's main reason for completing the Kokoda Trail was to raise awareness for Men's Health after we lost a cousin who had been suffering from depression for many years.'

Sometimes we all take our God given gifts for granted. It is

easy to lose focus on the important things in life. It can be hard for we parents let alone our children (especially teenagers) to slow down to think about how lucky we all are as the dawn of each new day brings on its challenges. It is the Kurt Fearnley's who show us all what is truly human. Their courage and determination to overcome individual issues, so they too can live their life to the fullest is an inspiring example.

2016 - 2019 School Review Program Catholic Education Melbourne reviews all Archdiocesan schools over a 4 year cycle. Ms Jan Hayes an experienced Catholic Education Reviewer will lead the external College review. The College community will be updated with the review schedule. Next week the College Leadership team meet with Mr Chris Bence from CEM to begin the initial processes in planning for the August review.

Rosey's cousin, *Shirley the Bear* was named in remembrance of Mrs Shirley Crowe, a long time Office Manager at Sacred Heart Cootamundra (Mercy Tradition) who passed away in 2004. In memory of Shirley, the Sacred Heart Colleges 'resident bear' was named in her honour and presented each Friday to a younger student to take home for the weekend, foremost as reminder of the care and happiness that Shirley showed to every student that entered the Office. Shirley the Bear was treated like royalty when driving off in the backseat of a family car or on the Friday afternoon bus. Now Rosey the Wombat has come to live at St. Mary's College and wants to be like her cousin, Shirley the Bear.

Is simplicity the key? The answers CAN be so simple to what seems

like an overwhelming problem but they often need CONSISTENCY to have an ongoing impact. Strategies and expectations require consistent reinforcement, encouragement, modifications and definitions, also needing adaptation to suit ages and situations.

As children grow, we often relax the intensity. This makes sense. However, we often forget that consistency is still required but with a different focus.

We teach children to acknowledge their feelings of anger or annoyance and how to manage it. We provide opportunities to develop their problem solving sills and conflict resolution strategies, often whilst they are in junior or middle primary. This may take a long time for these strategies to

become their default strategies and why continued and prolonged reinforcement and encouragement is paramount.

Parents, we share this load. We share the responsibility of growing independent and resilient individuals. It is important that we support each other through joyous and difficult times. So, I thank you for being wonderful human beings who have invested in your children's education by sending them to our school. Parental support of key issues is paramount in any success we may have. *Parents, never underestimate the difference you can make by consistently using wellbeing strategies throughout your child's life.* Home and school are the greatest influences on a child. Together, we can make a difference in your child, not only academically, but socially, emotionally and behaviourally.

The greatest wish of any teacher is for a student to positively manage life's twists and turns and to draw on the strategies CONSISTENTLY taught throughout their schooling years and be able to adapt these strategies to suit their situation. I look forward to seeing what together we can achieve.

**Junior Primary Activities** JPW are exploring addition. The year ones have been using playing cards to add two numbers together and the Preps have been working numbers to make ten.











It has been a term full of wonderful learning and sporting activities and we need to celebrate all of our students' achievements.
