"The golden rule, all lives have equal value and we should treat people, as we would like to be treated." Bill Gates 2013

When we hear the name Bill Gates, two words may come to mind, Microsoft and wealth. Mr Gates and his wife, Melinda intend to give most of their wealth to Third World needs before they pass on from this life. Eradicating polio; and malaria, sustainable agricultural development, supporting HIV and other medical research projects are high on their list. Improving the quality of life in the Third World rather than leaving their fortune to their children.....*"that wouldn't be good either for my kids or society.*" Gates once gave the following advice when speaking at a High School Assembly quoting, **Charles Sykes**, author of *Dumbing Down Our Kids*. Gates talked about how feel-good, politically correct teachings created a generation of American children with little concept of reality and how this concept set them up for failure in the real world. Perhaps some of what Gates quoted is universal:

- Life is not fair get used to it; If you think your teacher is tough, wait till you get a boss;
- Flipping burgers is not beneath your dignity. Your grandparents had a different word for burger flipping: they called it opportunity;
- If you mess up, it's not your parents' fault, so don't whine about your mistakes, learn from them;
- Before you were born, your parents weren't as boring as they are now. They got that way from paying your bills, cleaning your clothes;
- Television is not real life. In real life people actually have to leave the coffee shop and go to jobs;

Students are well protected in the school environment and it is not until they move into the real world that the realities of life hit home. Building a resilient student/son/daughter is so important. When life is good we are all good. When difficulty strikes that is when the strength of an individual's character enables a young adult to cope with what may confront them. A willingness to accept help, advice or guidance can be just the thing that enables an individual to move forward rather than remaining stuck. Parents who back teachers are building a resilient child. There has been much in the media lately on the power of words and if used in the wrong context the hurt and damage that can be caused. If only our society lived by *the golden rule, all lives have equal value and we should treat people, as we would like to be treated.* The conversation around the family dinner table can be the most powerful place to promote the understanding of tolerance.

Unacceptable behavior towards others will be addressed with age appropriate consequences for choices and actions. All incidents are resolved by re-educating all parties involved. As a parent, if you have concerns about your child's wellbeing, we encourage you to discuss things with your child to get all the background and then contact the homeroom teacher first as part of our process who may also have other facts to share with you, resulting in all stakeholders being heard equally.

Last Friday, we also had *College Photos* and we were pleased to see the day run smoothly and all students looking wonderful. DEMYSTIFYING NAPLAN ONLLINE - my how it's changing!

Exciting times ahead as we move to the online environment for NAPLAN. Here's a summary of the key features and implications for students, parents and teachers!

- easier for students to use need device and ear buds
- has tools for online screen zoom in/out, can flag questions to revise later, on line tools click to turn on/off, has audio: to listen to words for spelling or instructions when permitted
- has adaptive capability will give harder or easier questions to students base on their responses
- Is therefore personalised and inclusive of all students
- Has examples at <u>http://www.nap.edu.au/online-assessment/public-demonstration-site</u>
- Gives more personalised feedback and advice to students, parents and teachers

Term 1 - Week 9

- Yr 3, 5, 7 & 9 begin familiarisation with the website and the format of the assessment.
- Students will explore the online testing environment in class focusing on using strategies and thinkinglook at how to answer the question, what tools are there to use, how to move on or flag the question to come back later.
- Note students should not be concerned if they don't finish especially if they are 'competent at the year level' as the questions will adjust higher to challenge them and they may be at a much higher level than their age! A good thing.

Students in Yrs 3 and 5 will participate in a practice NAPLAN test environment in Week 1 Term 2, and can do as much learning as possible from the public demonstration website between now and then.

Students in Yrs 7 & 9 will practice at least 2 individual sessions between Monday and Wednesday this week. And then sit the Coordinated Practise Test on Thursday 28th March. This is a Statewide CPT.

This will be a 45 min assessment made up of questions from all areas expected.

Timetabled teachers will be with the classes at that time as well as an administrator – Mrs. Rowland (Yr 9) and Mr. Krammer (Yr 7).

Teachers, Parents and students can access the public demonstration site at any time! There are NO students who qualify for exemption or adjustment this year as the NAPLAN online environment caters for all our students.

If there are any comments, concerns or questions, please do not hesitate to contact the school.



Don't forget the ongoing **Premier's Reading Challenge**, if your child wants to participate they need to ask their teacher to let Mrs. Rowland know.
