


From the Principal

Dear Parents and Families,



Welcome back to Term 2. We hope your Easter was restful and although rain was (and is) scarce, the warmth of Autumn weather has been good for the soul. The following reflection by Andrew Hamilton, titled 'Easter and Anzac Day' provides some understanding of the struggles of humanity.



"The story of Easter expands to meet the large seasons of the

human heart, the stages of life's journey and the vulnerability of the natural world in which we live. It also offers hope that we and our world might one day be transformed. The Easter story is serious and far reaching. Anzac Day recalls matters of life and death, tragic events. Much of what was said by generals and politicians, was taken from the Easter story. 'They died that others might live.'



'They made the supreme sacrifice.' 'Their death was not in vain.' In the Easter story the connections that link death, in its various forms of loss, ageing, catastrophe and grief, with life and meaning are much more mysterious and complex.

Anzac Day remembers sacrifice, courage, death and of the loss of so many people and of so much promise. Jesus'



acceptance of death for others was important, but by itself it did not give full meaning to his life and death. The heart of the Easter story is that God raised Jesus from the dead. That was a gift. Both Easter and Anzac Day make a claim on us. We should never give up on life, our own or the life of any human being, no matter how hopeless it seems to be. If we appreciate life as a gift to be gratefully received and lived fully, we do not need to be afraid. We can respond generously to the needs of our world."

At the Seymour ANZAC Day Service St Mary's was represented by staff and our College Captains, Polly Duff and Dominic Plesey, two wonderful student leaders who laid a wreath in remembrance of St Mary's past students and of past parish community members who were brave, who sacrificed and who were selfless.

McIntyre Street Bus Upgrade and High Street Speed Zones Our College has been notified by Mitchell Shire that a contract has been signed to complete the Bust Stop upgrade. Works will begin at the end of Term Two and take six weeks. During the upgrade a temporary Bus Stop will be placed in Crawford Street near the presbytery. Families will be informed and reminded of the changes. Also, please be aware that electronic speed restriction signs are now placed in High Street. School time speed limits, morning and afternoon apply.

Vale Sr Rose Mary McGiffin rsm Former St Mary's College Principal On Tuesday 23rd April our St Mary's College and Parish community were represented at the requiem Mass for the late Sr Rose McGiffin rsm, a Sister of Mercy who had a long association with St Mary's College community. Sr Rose was well known in Seymour, a character who was staunch in her belief and support for rural Catholic education. Many past St Mary's students and parishioners will enjoy reading part of the Words of Remembrance said by Sr Mary Wickam rsm at the requiem. Sr Mary spoke beautifully and from the heart about a loyal Sister of Mercy now with Our Lord.

1/5/1938 Carrickfergus, County Antrim, Northern Ireland- 12/4/2019 Geelong, Victoria, Australia



"There's a famous Irish song about an exiled prisoner receiving the last rites from a priest. The exile asks the priest "(when I die) shall my soul pass through old Ireland?" I believe that's a question Sr Rose carried, and I imagined her soul winging its way to God via the northern coast of Ireland – coming in over the Giant's Causeway, past the famous Bushmills, down the magnificent Antrim coast to her birthplace of Carrickfergus, not far from Belfast. This was Sr Rose's spirit home and it held her all her life.

Sr Rose's parents Billy McGiffin and Jeanie McCallion made the decision to immigrate to Australia in 1948. Sr Rose was ten years old. Rose's father found work in a timber mill in Woodend and the family settled there. However, any thought of a secure family future was cruelly cut short when, in October 1952, Billy was killed after his motorcycle was hit by a car. He left his widow and nine children, the youngest, Jean, only a baby. Because of her father's death, Sr Rose left school at thirteen and worked in a café and bakery, and as housekeeper to the local priest, earning money to support the family. Her desire to become a Sister of Mercy later led her to return to school, no small decision, but typical of her

determination. Thanks to a scholarship, she completed her education at Sacred Heart College Kyneton, an experience she always recalled with great affection. Her family was precious to Sr Rose, simple as that- precious- and she loved all her siblings: Bobby, Billy, Neely, Seamus, Eileen, Eugene, Leo and Jean.

Sr Rose entered the Novitiate at Rosanna in 1956. It was as a teacher and then a Principal that Sr Rose lived out most of her life as a Sister of Mercy. She valued education from two perspectives – giving and receiving. As a teacher and Principal, Sr Rose was hardworking and enthusiastic. She was very pastorally oriented to the parents, children and staff in her care, with a special compassion for students with challenging behaviours. One of her colleagues from Seymour, on hearing of her death, wrote: "she was a wonderful educator and a feisty advocate for the people of Seymour...... like so many from Seymour I hold her in the highest regard." Over the years Sr Rose was a member of many extra-curricular Committees and Boards in the Sandhurst, Ballarat and Melbourne dioceses. Sr Rose had a large heart and whatever she did she gave it her all. Sr Rose's community and ministry appointments took her to locations as diverse as Seymour-(three times), Wodonga (twice), Casterton, Camperdown, Belmont, Colac, Cumberland St Newtown, Shepparton (twice), and North Melbourne. *At heart, Sr Rose was a country girl who loved the regional areas of Victoria*.

Sr Rose's friend Sr Rosemary Graham recalls their friendship, "Rose and I lived together in Shepparton in the mid-1980s. I valued her cheerful, forthright and generous disposition. I came to respect her as a woman who lived a simple life of commitment to Jesus, frugal really. She had a great devotion to the Eucharist. The community we lived in had a number of elderly Sisters, some more eccentric than others and some very eccentric indeed. Rose was immensely kind to them and had the knack of jollying them along with genuine warmth." Sr Rose had a true zest for life and a capacity for promoting joy in others. This was pre-eminently expressed through her singing with her trusty guitar, a gift she shared generously. Many a gathering has been enlivened by Rose's singing. She was completely self-taught, and had a pure, distinctive and beautiful voice. Someone said to me recently that if you gave Rose a guitar and an audience she was happy!

This has been a glowing tribute thus far, but Sr Rose, who requested I write this eulogy, would fully expect me to report some of her shortcomings. So... we all know Rose could be bloody- minded and stubborn. Sr Margaret Collis (Eleanor) who twice lived with Sr Rose, expresses it more delicately: "Rose was not easily swayed from her opinion." Sr Margaret

also said "Sr Rose gave a whole new meaning to the word stubborn." Sr Caroline Coyle, who was in the Novitiate with Sr Rose and lived with her in Seymour, reminisced about Sr Rose's vast, seemingly endless capacity for talk…and talk. Says Sr Caroline, "Sr Rose didn't just kiss the Blarney Stone; she swallowed a great chunk of it! But we loved her."

Sr Rose, you were one of a kind, McGiffin. We'll miss you. We thank you for witnessing to the sometimes hard task of being human, and for radiating the joy of being a glorious child of God. God is surely saying to you now only this: *Cead mile failte, macushla – a hundred thousand welcomes, darling.*"

If for any reason, your child is not in the correct uniform, please write a note or email the homeroom teacher. You will be contacted if your child is out of uniform after 3 times without reason. Studies have shown that when students are wearing a clean, tidy uniform it can make a huge impact on their overall mental wellbeing and feel good. Thank you for your ongoing support with this.

Positive Behaviour School At St Mary's our approach to student wellbeing and our approach to student management is informed by the Positive Behaviour Program. We have now been involved in this program for many years and the benefits are visible right around the College. Our College TAG and Student Expectations stem directly from PBS and provide the pillars on which our student wellbeing and management stand. Essentially the program equips staff with the tools to approach behavior issues in a manner that provides a positive outcome for the student. Just like we teach the curriculum, so too will we teach expected behavior.

An essential part of PBS is for the whole school to develop a rewards program. The rewards program is designed to instantly acknowledge those students who are exhibiting the expected behaviors. The students will be acknowledged at our level assemblies by the staff for following the expected behavior straight from our student expectations, as well as academic achievements throughout the term.

Level Assemblies We will have all 3 levels participating in morning level assemblies this term. Our P-4 have their weekly Monday morning assembly in the gardens at 8.45 am. Our Year 5-7's will have theirs in Week A on a Friday morning and our Year 8-10's will also have theirs in Week A on a Tuesday morning at 8.45am in the garden.

These assemblies are a wonderful opportunity for you as parents to come along and hear the current events happening within that level, any relevant information as well as possibly see your child acknowledged for all the wonderful his/her achievements. If your child is receiving an award, you will be notified via email prior to the day, so you can attend, but it will remain a surprise for your child. A collective photo of the award winners and names will be in our College Marian for that week.

Excursions We have a number of excursions within the next couple of weeks, across all levels of the College, so I encourage you to please check your CareMonkey and are aware of the relevant details for your child.

With all our Anzac day celebrations, we will have full coverage of events in next week's Marian form our Level Coordinators.

Once again, thank you for your ongoing support and we look forward to another productive, engaging term with you and your child. Please do not hesitate to come and see us, especially in week 3 when we have Parent/ teacher Conference times. This is the perfect opportunity for you to come and discuss not only the learning needs of your child, but equally the wellbeing needs.

Together, we work in partnership to engage, empower and motivate all our students.

Learning Conversations May 2019 Parent teacher meetings will be held on Monday 6th and Tuesday 7th May between 3.30 and 6.30pm each day. This is a very important part of the communication about your child's learning and capabilities at this stage of this year. We can plan for the next stage of learning when we work closely together.

The research shows that students who are fully engaged and achieving at their best happens when there is a supportive home and school relationship. I encourage all families to meet with at least one of your child's teachers.

NAPLAN Online All students in years 3, 5 7 and 9 have now trialed the NAPLAN online system, and are familiar with the format.
