

Remembrance Day Story He was very old now, but could still hold himself stiffly at attention before the monument. His war, the one to end all wars, now just a fading part of history. The faces of the boys he had to order into battle, the ones who would never come back, haunted him. Yet one nameless ghost was able to bring a measure of comfort to his tormented mind. At the sound of the gun signalling the eleventh hour he was mentally transported back to the fields of Flanders....

The battle had raged for over two hours, with neither side gaining any advantage. Wave after wave of soldiers had been dispatched from the muddy trenches and sent over the top. So many had died already that day that he decided he could not afford to lose any more men before reinforcements arrived. There came a slight lull in the battle due to the sheer exhaustion of the men on both sides.

During this interval, a young soldier came up to him requesting that he be allowed to go over the top. He looked at the boy who couldn't have been more than nineteen. Was this extreme bravery in the face of the enemy or was the soldier so scared he just needed to get it over with?

"Why would you want to throw your life away soldier? It's almost certain death to go out there."

"My best friend went out over an hour ago, captain, and he hasn't come back. I know my friend must be hurt and calling for me. I must go to him, sir, I must." There were tears in the boy's eyes. It was as if this were the most important thing in the world to him."

What purpose would it serve to let you sacrifice your life too?"

"At least I'd know I'd tried, sir, he'd do the same thing in my shoes. I know he would."

"All right soldier, you can go." Despite the horror all around them, he saw a radiant smile on the boy's face, as if a great weight had been lifted from his shoulders.

"God bless you, sir," said the soldier.

When he came to the makeshift hospital, he looked carefully through the casualties. He soon found himself before the prone body of the soldier, alive, but severely wounded. He knelt down beside the young man and gently laid a hand on his shoulder.

"I'm so sorry, son. I knew I was wrong to let you go."

"Oh no, sir. I'm glad you did and I'm glad you're here now so I can thank you. You see sir, I found my friend. He was badly wounded, but I was able to comfort him at the end. As I held him dying in my arms, he looked me in the eyes and said: "I knew you'd come."

As the bugle sounded "Taps", the old captain envisioned once again the young soldier's face. Looking up, he could almost hear the stone monument calling out to him: "I knew you'd come."

e-Smart & Cyber Safety Cyber Safety is a constantly evolving area where it is sometimes difficult to keep up with all of the developments and emerging threats. St Mary's College is a registered e-Smart school. As part of our e-Smart policy, we don't allow students to use mobile phones during school time. We also employ a comprehensive filtering system that protects staff and students from undesirable web content.

At home it is important that vigilance and cyber safety is also made a priority. There are many on-line resources that can assist in this. One that is particularly useful is [Think U Know](#). This Australian based website contains regularly updated information and advice. The Parent Portal includes links that will help you to set up [parental controls](#). It also contains [fact sheets](#) that detail specific issues connected to the mobile phone apps that your children are probably using.

Then we went to the **Old Parliament** - We started walking over to the national gallery we tried to get into Old Parliament but we got hard denied so we spent ½ an hour in a garden.

The National Gallery Highlights. The yellow room. One by one we stuck our heads into a box and it created an optical illusion. Then we went to **Mt Ainsley**. We stopped off at Mt Ainslie to have afternoon snack. We had chips and a juice box and we got a photo. Yeah.

Embassy Drive On the embassy we learnt about all the different embassies and found out that Donald Trump's embassy is the biggest embassy in Australia. Then we went to the **Monument Walk**. We stopped at the war memorial to meet with our tour guide. He took us on a long walk and showed us three statues. Then we went to the **CSIRO**. 

Some Tips for Parents of Yr 10 students going into year 11 VCE in 2019

Transition is easier for some students than for others. Some students take to VCE like ducks to water, for others, the first few months of VCE are a blind panic, as they struggle to keep their head above water as they figure out how to organise their notes, manage their time and structure their own revision. So, what's the reason behind this? What makes some students so much more suited for VCE than others? More importantly, what can you do to ensure that, come the start of Yr 11, *your child* is one of the students who thrives?

1. Encourage Their Independence

One of the biggest shocks that students encounter when they start VCE is how independent they are required to be. No longer will teachers walk them through every concept, tell them how to revise for tests, or give exact instructions about what homework needs to be done each week. While your child will still get assigned homework, this constitutes only a small fraction of the total work they need to be doing if they want to achieve good marks; the rest is made up of individual and self-determined study and revision.

2. Foster A Love Of Reading

If your child is going to perform well in VCE, they need to be able to read quickly, efficiently and productively for extended periods of time.

The ability to read well affects basically every subject. All you need to do is ensure that your child regularly has access to books and distraction-free spare time; all they need to do is to read as much and as widely as possible!

3. Develop Their Organisation Skills

As you can imagine, in VCE, the ability to stay organised makes a huge difference when it comes to revision. If your child is prone to losing their schoolwork, forgetting deadlines and keeping their notes in chaotic disarray, then now is the time to start establishing good habits. Encourage them to keep using a planner and develop a logical system for storing and organising their notes.

4. Encourage Goal Setting

Goal setting also allows students to focus on long-term tasks more effectively. Encourage your child to think about what *they* want to get out of VCE. Is there a course they are particularly passionate about? Is there a dream career they are chasing? The earlier you can encourage your child to step back and think about the big picture, the more motivated they will be once they start Yr 11.

Our Yr 9 students start their exams the week of November 30th as well and they too are starting to prepare themselves for revision sessions before these final assessments.

Two weeks ago our Yr 9 nine students experienced their B4W Urban camp in Melbourne. Their activities ranged from rock climbing, ice skating, visiting the Big Issue Magazine and Chinese museums to going up the Eureka Tower and eating Italian cuisine in an authentic Italian restaurant on Lygon Street. All three days were action packed and a huge thank you to Andrew Allen, David Carter, Karen Gilchrist and Kellie Giannarelli for your help and support on this urban

camp. Mrs Gilchrist kept tabs on how many steps we all do on her fitbit and in 3 days we all walked from Seymour to Nagambie...Wow! Super effort everyone!!!

Now that we are getting near the business end of the school year I would encourage all students to be organized, do your homework, submit all work requirements on time and start revising for exams early – a great recipe for finishing off 2018 in a positive and successful way!!!

Faith Education Yr 8s Catholic Social Teaching projects

In RE we have been learning about the Catholic Social Teachings. Our group decided to do *Caring for God's Creation*. We have chosen to show this Catholic Social Teaching by having a colouring competition for some of the Junior Primaries to raise awareness for the Mountain Pygmy Possum. The Mountain Pygmy Possum is a possum the size of your palm that lives in the alpine regions of the tops of mountains. It is in grave danger of extinction because it's main source of food has not been arriving at the mountains so it is starving. It's main source of food is called the Bogong Moth, it is a big moth, dusty grey in colour, with black and white markings. The Bogong Moth is sort of like a pizza on wings to the Mountain Pygmy Possum and provides all the fat and nutrients the possums need to raise their young. The Bogong Moth hasn't been arriving at the mountains when it should because the lights from cities and towns keep distracting them and leading them off course. 

