





will ever experience again. For all its joys and sufferings during the past two terms so much has been done by so many. There has been little time to reflect – every day was busy; every day non-stop. Yet we learnt more about our students, perhaps even about ourselves when new ways of working were required and flexibility became a daily event. Hello from Precious Plastic Monash!

We are emailing to inform you about our **FREE** school holiday workshops that we will be running these coming holidays! Please pass on this information to any students who might want to attend!

We will be running two different workshops this school holidays:

Plastic Pollution

Primary school workshop: Friday 25/9, 11am

Secondary school workshop: Friday 25/9, 1pm

In this workshop we will be delving into the world of plastic pollution, exploring why it is a problem and the ways that we can fix it. The interactive presentation will follow a story narrative set in Port Phillip Bay, explaining how plastic can escape the waste stream and touching on topics including microplastics and bioaccumulation.

Plastic Recycling

Primary school workshop: Thursday 1/10, 11am

Secondary school workshop: Thursday 1/10, 1pm

Understanding where our plastic goes and what happens to it once we put it into our kerbside recycling bin is important for thinking about ways to improve the recycling system. In this workshop, we will explore how Precious Plastic Monash recycles plastic into new products, and play games to test students' knowledge of at-home recycling.

All workshops will run for around 1 hour, and there will be an opportunity for Q&A with the presenters (University students involved in Precious Plastic Monash!) afterward.
