I asked Lynne about their origins and was recommended to speak to Mrs Brock. Thank you Jennine for kindly providing some history to why these two garden benches watch over many a passer-by:



Their story.....

"As you walk past the Mercy Centre you may have noticed two timber garden benches that have been looking very sad and sun bleached for some time. Not anymore! Lynne has given them both a new lease of life with a coat of stain. They look fabulous and it got me to thinking.....they are a special part of our College history, as they are memorials to two very special people.

Christine Murphy (nee O'Keefe) was a Library Assistant at St Mary's for many years. She grew up across the road, attended St Mary's and Sacred Heart (as did her children) and was the sister to Kate, our crossing supervisor. One brother Peter is the proprietor of IGA, another, Knuckles (Frances) drives our school buses and the family has loads of extended family

members in the district. Sam, Ben and Mia Brown are her great nephews and niece. Christine was a huge motivator in getting St Mary's Junior Netball Club up and running, many years ago. To this day we have an annual award in her honour. Sadly Chris lost her battle with cancer in September 2004.

Mark Williams was a past student who lost his battle with leukemia just after his 14th birthday in 2004. He was the son of Linda and Malcolm, and brother to Erin. Both Mark and Erin attended St Mary's from Foundation. Mark was granted a trip to Africa from the 'Make A Wish' Foundation but unfortunately was too unwell to have that last adventure with his family. He was a mad Bomber supporter and loved motorbikes, fishing and camping. After Mark was diagnosed, Erin decided to dedicate her life to finding a cure for childhood illnesses. She graduated as a nurse and is currently working at The Epworth Hospital. She continues to be highly driven and is studying further in the Medical Science field. We have such a rich history and I just wanted to share this chapter." (Mrs Brock)

There is always a story to be told! At St Mary's we have 'wonderful keepers of the story' with Mrs Brock and other long serving staff so in touch with the College's history. May we never lose the richness of the story. We all stand on the shoulders of those who have gone before us.


from the Level Co-ordinator




Foundation had a practise Google Meet yesterday with their students which was hugely successful. Students were thrilled to see their teacher and their teacher thrilled to see them!




















Year 8-10 News

Students have been encouraged (where possible) to walk to the end of their driveway and tune into ABC radio on Saturday morning just before 6am to join the national ANZAC Dawn Service.





Science and Technology

Environmental Science: 7B's Vison for 2040

After watching the 2040 documentary, Year 7B students have been busy working on social action plans that they hope will improve the school community. Their 2040 visions are focused on reducing landfill waste at the school, reducing energy consumption and reducing carbon emissions from transport.

So far, the students have led the Clean Up Australia Day activities, being supported by all the Year 3 & 4 students. They recently analysed the collected waste from that day, finding mostly single use plastics. Some students have begun making compost bins with design help from Mr. Allen and donated bins from Mitchell Shire Council. These bins will be placed around the school yard to reduce the amount of organic waste going into the schools' landfill waste.

All of the projects are aimed to reduce our school communities' impact on the environment with the added bonus of saving the school money.



Composting

Due to COVID-19 the compost bins have not been placed around the school. This will occur once school returns to normal. The 7B class are now working on homebased composting and other waste

Composting is a great way to use a resource that would otherwise go to landfill. With many councils now offering FOGO (Food Organic Green Organic) services, the Year 7B Environmental Science students investigating a 2040 Vision for food in our school community have teamed up with the year 9 & 10 Ag class to repurpose some old recycle bins. The bins donated by Cleanaway will be turned into school compost bins and placed strategically around the school yard. 7B engaged their Media Studies class to organise a poster competition and Tora Ryan's poster was selected by Ms Richards and Mr Allen to be made into a sticker for each of the bins to remind students what can be placed in these bins.

Create, Skate Relate - Due to COVID-19, Youth Week has been postponed with the Victorian Government hoping to reset the date later in the year. Once school returns to normal routines Create, Skate and Relate will restart.


Create, Skate and Relate is an extra-curricular initiative funded by the Victorian Government, Victorian Youth Week. With around 50 students showing interest the workshops that run twice weekly have students allocated to attend. In Term the first workshop commenced with 20 plus students coming together to work and form the skate boards using Roarockit Australia veneers and supporting vacuum bags. Roarockit is based in Yarrawonga and has been selling board kits for many years. The plan is to make a



number of board types for students to decorate showing ways in which they are comfortable making friendships and building relationships. Look forward to some creative works to be rolling out of the technology room at lunchtimes on Tuesday and Thursdays.

School Photos 2020 - St Mary's College Seymour

Annual school photos have been taken.

To be able to view the images of your child and order photos, you will need to register online.

- 1. Go to https://order.arphotos.com.au
- 2. Enter the 2020 image code for your child (from their personalised flyer, which was sent home on photo day)
- 3. Fill in your email and mobile details

That's it! You'll be notified by email/SMS when 2020 images are ready to view and purchase.

In the webshop you can view photos and customize your photo package; Choose ANY layout, ANY image plus purchase digital image downloads.

Even if you registered last year, you still need to register again this year to link your child's images for the current year with your details.

Once registered, please wait for notification that 2020 images are online to view before making your purchase.

To be notified when images are ready to view – Register Online Now.

In the case of separated families, the Unique code can be used more than once and no prior personal or order details will be visible to the other party.
