

Dear Parents and Guardians

St Mary's is blessed to have a dedicated and creative teaching and non-teaching staff. We expect high standards of ourselves and of each other in ensuring our students move forward in their learning and in their relational formation as teenagers. The latter can obviously be challenging as our older students navigate their teenage years. There are boundaries at St Mary's, as there are at home.

Boundaries, what are boundaries?

I do not profess to be an expert in bringing up children. I know from personal experience of having four children that as a father I made mistakes along the way. What I do know though, with some certainty is that children actually want and need boundaries. Outwardly a child or teenager will not be 'cool' with boundaries, internally they will acknowledge the security, the sense of safety and the order that boundaries provide. A few thoughts on boundaries:

Social media time at night – a disaster waiting to happen if children are allowed to have devices in the bedroom at lights out time. Very few children have the self-discipline to switch off. Some are on their phones well into the early hours of the morning. Simple solution – at bed time the computer and phone are not allowed in the room.

Sleep – medical research is conclusive that school age children need 9-11 hours of sleep a night. If not obtained so many areas of themselves are affected. The least of which is cranky children at home and in the classroom.

The No Word – It is very, very difficult to introduce the word No to a teenager if for most of their younger years they have always heard and expect the word, Yes.

Wandering – Know where our children are. Wandering leads to wandering.

Diet - Medical evidence is overwhelming of how an insufficient diet affects how our body and mind operate.

Gossip and Positive Self Talk – Children are influenced by what they see and what the hear. Adult conversations are for adult ears.

Parents are not only your Friend - Friends usually get what they want. Parents ensure you get what you need.

Parent Relationships – It not uncommon for children and teenagers to live in two households or have parents who are not together. In these family situations the children who are well rounded and balanced are the children where parents make an effort to be on the same page.

Unified – Children are brilliant at trying to divide and/or conquer mum and dad.

No one is given the official parenting manual when children come into the world. There is a lot of trial and error and so often we rely on the parenting we received to inform our approach to the incredible responsibility of being a mother or father. Teenagers will one day do the same.





F-12 Planning Update

10th June: Tim Newcomb the new Principal of Marymede Catholic College South Morang visited St Mary's today to discuss how Marymede can support St Mary's Victorian Registration Assessment Authority (VRQA) application to return to Year 12. Healthy eating – School Lunches

- Healthy lunches and snacks help children concentrate and play throughout the day.
- Encourage your child to be involved in their own lunch preparation and discuss choices with them.
- Try to include a variety of foods from each of the 5 food groups.
- If making lunches ahead of time, keep them in the fridge until leaving for school or freeze in advance.
- Involve your children in healthy choices

What to put in healthier school lunches

The six key parts to a healthy lunchbox include:

- <u>Fruit</u> best choices include fresh or tinned fruit. Dried fruit is sticky and high in sugar, so have it occasionally.
- <u>Vegetables</u> try fresh crunchy vegetable sticks with dip or a small container with mixed vegetables such as cherry tomatoes, carrot sticks, capsicum and cucumber.
- <u>Milk, yoghurt or cheese</u> you can use reduced-fat options for children over the age of 2 years. For children
 who cannot tolerate milk products, offer appropriate daily alternatives like calcium fortified <u>soy</u> or rice drink
 or soy yoghurt.



- <u>Meat</u> or meat alternative foods try lean meat (like chicken strips), a hard-boiled egg or peanut butter. If your school has a nut-free policy, peanut butter and other nuts should not be included in your child's lunchbox.
- <u>Grain or cereal foods</u> like a bread roll, flat bread, fruit bread or some crackers (wholegrain or wholemeal options).
- <u>Drinks</u> tap water is best.







What not to put in healthier school lunches

Some items do not belong in a healthy school lunchbox. Six items to avoid when preparing lunch for your children include:

- All <u>sweet drinks</u> such as fruit juices, fruit drinks, cordials, sports drinks, energy drinks, flavoured waters, flavoured mineral waters, iced teas and soft drinks. These are high in energy (kilojoules) and sugar, and can lead to weight gain and oral health problems in children.
- Dried fruit bars and 'straps'. These are low in fibre and are also high in sugar and can stick to children's teeth, causing tooth decay.
- Dairy desserts, chocolate bars and muesli bars. These are generally high in fat and sugar.
- Chocolate spreads, jams and honey in sandwiches. These add extra, unnecessary sugar to the lunchbox
- Fatty, salty processed meats such as salami and Strasburg.
- 'Oven-baked' savoury biscuits. These may sound like healthier options, but some are just as high in salt and fat as crisps.



Uniform Reminders

All students are expected to wear the full and correct College uniform each day. The uniform is to be worn appropriately and should reflect the personal pride each student has in themselves and the College. PE uniform is to be worn on PE days only.

Accessories: The college beanie and scarf are the only additional items to be worn. No alternate additions are permitted with the uniform e.g. Visible T-Shirts, bike shorts, vests, leggings, skins, headbands, scarves etc.

Shoes: Under Child Safety Regulations, Black Leather Lace School Shoes Only. BOOT STYLE and T-BAR STYLE are NOT permitted. Black runners are not permitted to be worn on Uniform days. (PE - proper runners - No skate or volleys or similar)

Jewellery:

- A wristwatch,
- Up to two pairs of plain ear studs or sleepers in the ear lobe only (unobtrusive and small in size),
- A small religious medal on a fine chain will be permitted under clothing (no other necklace or pendant permitted),

• Jewellery other than that listed above is not to be worn at school, e.g. rings, bracelets, necklaces, wrist bands (medical bands allowed).

Body and Facial Piercings: are not permitted

Make up/Nails:

• Makeup is not encouraged, but must be kept to a minimum and natural looking - the student will be asked to remove it at the commencement of the next lesson break *if too excessive*.

- Coloured nail polish is NOT permitted, only clear permitted. Students will be asked to remove coloured polish at the commencement of the next lesson break.
- Fake nails and fake eyelashes are NOT permitted.

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

EDUCATION

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students

HOW TO APPLY

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from www.education.vic.gov.au/csef

If you applied for the CSEF at your child's school in 2021, you do not need to complete an application form in 2022 unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- **new student enrolments**; your child has started or changed schools in 2022 or you did not apply in 2021.
- changed family circumstances; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2022.

Check with the school office if you are unsure.


