Dear Parents and Guardians

The RVS (respiratory syncytial virus) is causing havoc. A virus that can be common in children and adults, but particularly serious for infants. Add in Covid-19 and the stress on the hospital system is obvious. Our students and staff have returned to wearing masks when indoors. For the present time staff have returned to non-face to face meetings and other measures. Since early in Term One 2022 St Mary's College staff and students have been outstanding in coping with the constant daily changes that have been required.

Enrolments

There were 13 new students enrolled at St Mary's at the beginning of Term 3. Enrolments are increasing and if you are aware of families considering St Mary's please recommend they contact the College Enrolment Registrar, Mrs Gail Strahan sooner rather than later.

Primary Learning Centre

ROAM Architects are designing a concept drawing of the area immediately alongside the PLC building. F-2 staff will review the concept drawing and Maintenance Manager Nick Liddell will consider the works that can be done in house and the works that may require tendering.

VCE Coordinator

The successful applicant will be announced to the College community Monday 25th July. The interview panel were impressed with the calibre of applications, the preferred applicant has the experience and knowledge and is looking forward to working closely with students, staff, parents and local providers as St Mary's plans for the future.

Finance Position

A finance position (accountant qualified) will soon be advertised for a person to join the College Finance Team. This year the College welcomed Lisa Cinquegrana and Laura Byers as part of the Finance team. Both colleagues are highly skilled in their roles and once this position is filled the finance team will be well prepared for the College's future growth and for MACS financial compliances and regulation.

Stage 0 Project & Master Plan

In consultation with MACS the College is planning for a 2022 Stage 0 self-funded project. ROAM Architects will plan for an extra primary classroom between the Year 3 and 4 rooms. There will be two general purpose meeting rooms added to the Administration building to provide more appropriate admin workflow and workspace functionality.

Stage 1 & Capital Grants Application Process

In line with the Master Plan St Mary's will apply for a major grant in the 2023 round of funding for a Stage 1 project. Wayne Hay (MACS Infrastructure Policy & Strategy Officer) will visit this term to tour College infrastructure. Sebastian Russell (MACS Capital Delivery Officer, Capital Program Delivery Infrastructure and Capital Funding Officer) is supporting the Stage 1 Grant application and working with the College to develop our future capital work's needs.

College Branding



F-12 Pathway Working Parties Planning

Working Parties have been formed to ensure the important scope of F-12 needs are covered in preparation for Day 1 2024. They will meet periodically to ensure the strategic timelines of tasks are completed. The Working Party Teams are Compliance & Buildings; Finance; Staffing; Curriculum; Wellbeing and Catholic Identity; Communications and Partnerships.

Careers Development & Practice

MACS recommend St Mary's undertakes an audit on Careers education as we prepare for 11/12 and the coming changes to VCE/non VCE pathways. There are over 40 Colleges currently undertaking the audit tool. The audit will be very important for future senior students and for students who need guidance in their younger secondary years.

St Mary's Parish

Greetings parents and friends,

We have arrived at that moment in the year where many parents have participated in the wonderful reception of the sacraments of Reconciliation, Eucharist, and Confirmation. This is a cause of great joy for so many: the candidates themselves, their parents and friends, the school staff and community as well as the parish community. And this is a well-deserved reason for joy.



However, there is a great deal of tension and discussion over the frequency of families using the sacraments of Reconciliation and Eucharist. In an ideal world this would be a strongly founded issue of discipline and observance. This is not an ideal world, not even close to ideal; so, what is it that is keeping people away from these two intimate moments of union with Jesus?

Let me present this to you in a way that everyone can understand; both parents and children have a very limited idea of who Jesus is to them because they have little to no relationship with him. Take our First Eucharist candidates, they were excited to receive Jesus, to have the after-party, even to put to the test my claim that they can ask almost anything of Jesus, and they would have that prayer granted. But when you ask them, 'who is Jesus to you?' it is very hard for them to answer because they have no living relationship with him. For me to say that Jesus has been waiting for this moment for so long cannot be reflected in the anticipation of the candidates. They anticipated the day, the ceremony, and the party, but not the moment of finally having union with Jesus.

Think about it; would you say that the children were as excited and eager for that moment as they are for birthdays, Christmas, or grandparents' visits? If not, then why not? We are not talking about church activities; we are talking about a personal relationship with and about Jesus, finally getting to be with him.

May I suggest to parents and friends, help these children develop their knowledge and love for God through reading and prayer. School can help but it cannot substitute, for if it is not important to you, no school can make it important to your child. If you have no interest in a relationship with God, no interest in showing to them your relationship with God, it will never mean anything to them. I would also like to invite you to send me any questions so that I can help you in this exercise of loving care for your children.



New Victorian Child Safe Standards

The Victorian Child Safe Standards (CSS) aim to:

- Promote the safety of children
- Prevent child abuse
- Ensure organisations and businesses have effective processes in place to respond to and report all allegations of child abuse.



In July 2021, the Victorian Government announced new Child Safe Standards to further strengthen the culture and practices of organisations working with children. From the 1 July 2022, 11 new Victorian Child Safe Standards will replace Victoria's seven current Child Safe Standards and principles in place since 2016.

The diagram below shows the changes to the requirements.

National Guideline for supporting autistic children and their families

Dear Parents.

The Autism CRC has released the draft version of the National Guideline for supporting the learning, participation, and wellbeing of autistic children and their families in Australia on 18th July 2022.

The draft is released for public feedback for 6 weeks, closing at 5:00pm (AEST) on 29 August 2022. All members of the community are welcome to provide feedback.

The Guideline will support families to make informed choices when accessing services, and provide professionals with a set of recommendations to guide ethical and effective service delivery. The recommendations will be based on the best available research evidence and a comprehensive community consultation process.

The Guideline is being developed according to the National Health and Medical Research Council's recommended process.


The Guideline will be informed by research evidence (building on the synthesis completed in 2020), reviews of previous autism guidelines, and the experiences of individuals on the autism spectrum and their families accessing therapy and support services, and comprehensive community consultation.

NCCD Information Sheet for Parents, Carers and Guardians



What is the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data?

Schools must now complete the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD) every year. It counts the number of students who receive additional adjustmen or "help" at school because of a disability. The NCCD helps governments plan for the needs of students with disability.

Who is counted in the data collection?

To count a student in the NCCD, schools must think through some key questions

- 1. Is the student getting help at school so that they can take part in education on the same basis as other students?
- 2. Is the help given because of a disability? The word 'disability' comes from the <u>Disability</u>
- <u>Discrimination Act 1992</u> (DDA) and it can include many students.

 Has the school talked to you or your child about the help that they provide?
- 4. Has the school kept records about the help they provide, the student needs and the reasons that the student needs this help? The school will need to keep copies of tests, student work, assessments, records of meetings, medical reports or other paperwork and information about how the student's learning is moving along over time

Once the school decides that the student should be counted in the NCCD, they then choose a sability group and one of four levels of help that has been give

What does the word 'disability' mean in the NCCD?

In the NCCD the word 'disability' comes from the <u>Disability Discrimination Act 1992</u> (DDA). There are four types of disability that the school can choose from: sensory, cognitive, social-emotional and physical. In the NCCD the word 'disability' comes from the Di-

Many students that need help at school can be counted in the NCCD. For example, students with learning problems, e.g. specific learning disability or reading difficulty (sometimes called dyslexia), health problems (e.g. epilepsy or diabetes), physical disability (e.g. cerebral palsy), vision/hearing loss and social-emotional problems (e.g. selective mutism, Autism Spectrum Disorder, anxiety).

Letters from doctors or specialists can be very helpful for schools as they plan how to support students with their learning. Schools do not need to have these letters before they can count a

student in NCCD. Teachers can use all that they know about the student's learning and the records that they have collected over time to decide if a student can be counted in the NCCD.

What sort of help does the school give students?

Students need different types of help at school. Some students need a little help sometimes while other students need a lot of help nearly all the time. The type of help given depends on the needs of the student. The help can include changes to the school buildings or grounds (e.g. ramps or things like special desks or chairs), extra teacher help in classes, special learning programs, changes to the work they give the student or extra adult help.

How will the NCCD be different this year?

All schools have been counting students in the NCCD since 2015. The government will use the NCCD data as part of the funding to schools.

What will the school need to know about my child for the NCCD?

ols work together with families to understand the needs of each child. It is helpful if families give their child's teacher a copy of any letters or reports they have. The letters or reports will help give time clinic steadile a copy of any rectes of reports mey name. The rectes of reports will help the school understand the child and the help that they might need. Letters from doctors, psychologists, speech pathologists, doctor, and occupational therapists etc. can be very helpful for schools. These reports along with information that the teacher has (i.e. school based tests, your child's work and learning plans) helps the school to understand and meet your child's needs.

What happens to the NCCD data? Who will have the NCCD information?

Each school principal must check the NCCD data in August of each year. The school will give the information to the Catholic Education Office. The school will work with the Catholic Education Office to make sure that the NCCD data is OK before they give the data to the government. The government will not be given the names of any students or any letters or records. Please ask your chool for their privacy policy if you need to kno

Does the school need me to agree with them about counting my child in the NCCD?

Amendments were made to the Austra an Education Act 2013 and Au 2013). Schools do not need you to agree to let them count a child in the NCCD. You cannot ask the not to count your child.


Book Week

E-cigarettes and Vaping Facts

• Electronic cigarettes, or e-cigarettes are battery-operated devices that heat liquids to produce a vapour that looks like smoke, which users inhale. Using an e-cigarette is often called "Vaping".



- E-cigarettes are known by many different names. They are sometimes called "e-cigs," "e-hookahs," "mods," "vape pens," "vapes," "tank systems," and "electronic nicotine delivery systems (ENDS)."
- The liquid used in e-cigarettes to make the aerosol often contains **nicotine** and "appealing-sounding" flavourings, such as chocolate, bubble gum and fruity flavours which are **chemicals**. This liquid is sometimes called "e-juice," "e-liquid," "vape juice," or "vape liquid.
- Many e-cigarettes look like traditional cigarettes or cigars. Some resemble USB devices, pens or pipes.
- There are more than 460 brands of e-cigarettes (e.g., Ripple, Sticky fingers, That's My Jam) and around 7,700 flavours worldwide.

Teenagers and young people, who wouldn't try 'real' cigarettes, may be attracted to vaping.

1 in 5 teenagers have tried vaping.



This image below shows examples of the types of e-cigarettes.

E-cigarette aerosol is NOT harmless water vapor

The e-cigarette aerosol that users breathe from the device and exhale can contain harmful and potentially harmful substances.

Some e-cigarettes advertised as 'nicotine free' may not be accurately labelled and <u>may contain nicotine</u> or other dangerous chemicals. You cannot rely on such marketing claims.



Most products that involve inhaling chemicals into the lungs (like an Asthma puffer) go through a long testing process to prove they are safe. These tests have not been conducted on the e-cigarettes available in Australia, so their safety can't be guaranteed.

E cigarettes are unregulated in Australia.

What Are the Health Risks of Vaping?

Addiction: E-cigarettes contain nicotine, a drug that's highly addictive. You don't have to vape every day to get addicted.

Anxiety and Depression: Nicotine makes anxiety and depression worse. It also affects memory, concentration, self-control, and attention, especially in developing brains.

Becoming a smoker: Young people who vape are 3 times more likely to start smoking tobacco cigarettes and may be more likely to develop other addictions in the future.

Impotence: There is evidence that vaping can cause sexual dysfunction in men.

Sleep problems.

Exposure to cancer-causing chemicals.

Chronic bronchitis. (inflammation of your windpipe)

Lung damage that can be life-threatening

Heart problems: Users are more likely to have a heart attack or stroke.

Health Warnings

- E-cigarettes are relatively new products, so we don't know a lot about their long-term health effects. The first commercialised e-cigarette product was developed in 2003 in China.
- Liquid nicotine refills for e-cigarettes are very dangerous both for children and adults. Nicotine is a poison that can be absorbed through the skin and accidental swallowing of liquid nicotine can be lethal.
- One teaspoon of liquid nicotine refill is enough to cause permanent damage or even death, particularly in children.
- Defective e-cigarette batteries have caused some fires and explosions.
- Children and adults have been poisoned by swallowing, breathing, or absorbing e-cigarette liquid through their skin or eyes
- What are the laws in Australia?
- E-cigarettes with e-liquid containing nicotine is illegal without a *prescription from a Medical Practitioner*
- Vaping in indoor and outdoor smoke-free zones (public places like schools) is illegal
- The sale of **all** e-cigarettes to people under the age of 18 is illegal
- The use of e-cigarettes in cars carrying children under the age of 16 is illegal
- Promotional advertising in retail stores of e-cigarettes is illegal
- Selling nicotine vaping products in retail shops such as tobacconist, vape shops and convenience stores is illegal

Fines apply for users who ignore the laws.


