School Improvement and Excellence

School improvement is a continuous process that requires reflection and input from the entire school community. School improvement is centred on maximising outcomes for all students. As we progress to the introduction of Year 11 in 2024 and Year 12 in 2025, feedback from our St Mary's College parent/guardian community is important and necessary.

MACSSIS is a survey tool used by Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools (MACS) to gather data for school improvement. At St Mary's College all students in Year 4-10, all teachers and non-teaching staff and a sample of families will be invited to participate in MACSSIS through a secure online portal from Monday 29th August to Friday 16th September 2022. On Friday 9th September, our Year 9 students will have the opportunity to take part in St Mary's College first Year 9 Pathways Day. The purpose of this day is to introduce students to the core and elective subjects they will undertake as they move into Year 10, the start of their senior education journey. This will also allow our students to begin the process of unpacking different Pathway choices, beginning the process of investigating the different options available at Years 11, 12 and beyond.

Our Year 9 students will gain insight into the subject content included in Year 10 core subjects and electives being offered in 2023, as they speak to teachers of the subjects they will undertake and have the chance to ask questions to inform their decisions. They will also be able to speak with representatives from Seymour GoTafe to investigate external VET options and representatives from the Central Ranges Local Learning and Employment Network.

Our students will also participate in study skills and time management workshops run by Elevate Education. These workshops will help our students to start to develop the good work habits and ethics needed for success in their studies, no matter what pathway they might eventually choose.

Our students will have time to reflect on the day, ask questions and have the opportunity to take away a variety of information to discuss with you at home, including a Year 10 Subject Handbook and links to various pathways websites.

Oh how wonderful that Spring is here and with the sunshine (soon hopefully, after the rain) comes a bright and positive outlook from all those around us. The weather has such an impact on our demeanor and attitude towards each day. In our jobs of teaching, we see changes in our surroundings - in the yard, in the classroom, in the attitude of students towards their work and their friends. We feel the same change. Life feels good and we try to take the time to embrace it.

With a bright future in mind, we come back to the present. Past midway through Term 3 and kids are tired. We need to remember that this is Year 2's first full year of onsite learning! Couple that with Term 3 traditionally being a long and cold term, and the result is tiredness. Tiredness leads to impatience, over reactions, a niggle or a gripe and cannot always be cured by one good night's sleep (although it helps). So to support our little ones to the end of term as positively as possible, please have conversations about problem solving, thinking about best options before acting and always trying to use kindness. Our lunchtime activities are rolling on and providing an alternative to the yard. We have had 'Walk of the Whales' drawing, Tangrams, Celebrity Heads and Minute to Win it games. Students are engaging and even beginning to come up with some of their own ideas!

Last week we were very fortunate to spend time with Mr Andrew Allen and the Year 9 Ag students in the St Francis of Assisi vegetable garden. Year 2A dug around in the soil, looked at current plantings and listened to what the students had been doing as part of their studies. 2A were encouraged to eat broccoli straight from the garden, try the herb mint and be aware of stinging nettle! Mr Allen cooked up a simple dish of broccoli and herbs actually in the garden! Students were impressed and even some who said 'I'll never eat that', tried it and liked it. Thank you Mr Allen and Year 9's.

Year 2 has been testing theories about Forces - Push and Pull. They used various accessories to determine the force required to move toy cars. They also experimented with elevation and different surfaces to determine if that made a difference to the distance the car was able to travel.

2023 Foundation students had their first transition visit at St Mary's with Miss Head and Mrs Charles last Monday. Parents and children alike were welcomed into the PLC. Children were excited to watch a story and complete an activity. We are looking forward to our second transition this Monday 5th September.

Year 2 students were very fortunate to have Melbourne Renegades / SEDA students visit. The instructors were very good at setting up activities and providing guidance on improving cricket skills. It was a great way to spend a Monday morning!

Wheelie Wednesday has been a huge success and no less this week with the Year 1 students. Roller skates, lots of scooters, a skateboard and some snazzy bikes lapped the MPH for lunchtime. The smiles on students' faces were delightful! Next up...Foundation students!!

Year 6 Camp: Valley Homestead

Year 6 camp was a fantastic opportunity to see our students in an environment outside of the classroom. The deep connections and experiences were plain to see as Year 6 tested and challenged themselves.

Accommodation:

The accommodation was a collection of lovely old mud-brick buildings where the fires were roaring and the staff were accommodating. We enjoyed a range of delicious food, I can confidently say that no one went hungry during our camp as the food was plenty.

In the evening of Day 2 we were lucky enough to enjoy a walk along the private creek, which led to a small shelter in the bush. The students were treated to a campfire under the stars, with joke telling, Chinese Whispers, Marshmallows and hot Milo. We were lucky enough to have Mr Smith join us for the second night at camp who very much enjoyed the fresh air of North East Victoria.



Activities:

The initiatives course tested our communication and teamwork which set the scene for the theme of the camp. Students had to lead each other blindfolded through a ropes course, solve their way across a fake river and work as a team to get a tyre over a large pole.

Rockclimbing was the first of many heights-based challenges which was a great start as students could climb to where they felt comfortable and then repel back down. Mrs. Brock scaled the wall in record time.

Abseiling was the next challenge which was a real test of nerve. It took a real determined attitude to be able to hang backwards over the edge of the 10m platform. Mr Harding found this extremely challenging but got there!

The vertical slide sparked the interest of our students, but hanging over a 3m drop was no easy feat as some struggled with the thought of letting themselves drop!! It certainly stayed true to the name of 'Free Fall'.

Over all it was a fantastic experience. I would like to thank Mrs Brock for her unwavering support and our volunteers, Paul O'Dwyer and Chelsea Lynch for their help. These volunteers were always willing to participate and assist in anyway. The students really enjoyed how they got in and got involved with what was happening.

Food Technology & 9/10 Design technology textiles

A new group of year 7's enter the food technology kitchen each term. This has been a delightful group who have learnt the art of presentation very easy on. Each lesson we have a mini challenge of presentation and taste with guest judges. Following is the first week with pancakes.



Muffins both savoury and sweet were prepared.



Jam drops may sound simple, but be aware consistency of shape and size goes a very long way when in a competition. These biscuits were all delightful to taste.

Discussions were held about eating breakfast, and the costing of muesli if you eat in a Café. So comparisons were made between muesli slice, toasted muesli and Bircher muesli. All very similar ingredients with very different textures and tastes.

On the theme of breakfast, we ventured into all boiled, french toast and poached were all sampled.



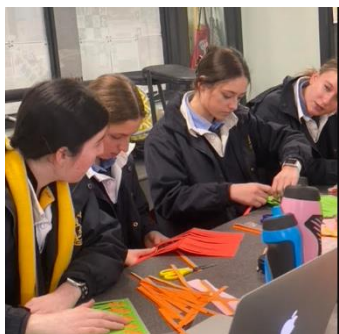
Then with egg whites we can add sugar to make desserts! Did you know that if the white is whipped enough you can hold the bowl over your head and the mixture does not fall out?

Or..... that when the pavlova is in the oven, there is nothing better than licking the beaters.

Sales, fresh foods and healthy eating are the end of the term. I am impressed when students ask for extra ingredients, or something to add to the presentation of their plate. It was also interesting to listen to students talk about their favourite salads and how much they enjoy food.



The year 9/10 Design technologies - textile students have been expanding their skills and experimenting with how textiles may be formed. We looked at warp and weft in weaving designs. Heads were bent down and the concentration was intense when we trialled weaving with paper.



There was a quiet concentration over the class as students experimented with colours and knotting a friendship bracelet.



The next challenge was with re-cycling plastic and making a bonded material. This involved the layering of plastics and semi melting with a hot iron in-between waxed paper.



The most enlightening classes have involved knitting, we all have tried to knit a square and then make a toy. If you have the time, try and knit with your child as it is a repetitive stitch, but until you work out that one stitch it is very difficult. One student could knit, two more had do so in the past and the rest were novices, we tried and tried.



Now we are making a toy that can be sent to a third world country by post. Some students are hand stitching felt, machine stitching something small, knitting a toy or making a game. The room is busy to say the least.

This week we will start with the dying of materials. The year 9/10 students are trialling and experimenting whilst adding to their skillset and will finalise with a project of choice from methods learnt.

WATTA WATNANDA DAY 2022

Melbourne Archdiocese of Catholic Schools in partnership with the Aboriginal Catholic Ministry Melbourne, Australian Catholic University, Korin Gamadji Insitute and Richmond Football Club invited all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students enrolled in Catholic schools to attend Watta Watnanda Day.

This day of cultural and community connection for all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander secondary students was held this year on Friday 19th August. The venue was the Korin Gamadji Institute, Maurice Rioli Room, Richmond Football Club, Punt Road, Richmond.

Our 2 students who represented St Mary's – Ryan McCarthy and Flynn Brennan - epitomised the 2022 NAIDOC theme:

Get Up, Stand Up, Show Up.

These Year 7 students travelled down to Richmond on the train and spent the day participating in a wide variety of activities with 206 other indigenous secondary students. Ryan and Flynn reported that they played games that taught them about the strategies used for survival and hunting as well as for preparing young men for battle, made possum skin wristbands and tile art and listened to talks from indigenous adults from the world of sport who spoke about what it means to them to be an Indigenous leader. Representatives from Australian Catholic University talked about the opportunities that are available to Indigenous youth when they leave school and are considering a pathway involving a tertiary education. The students were taken on a local walk to see significant sites which included a sacred tree that had been used to cut a shield from, many generations ago.

It was a very early start and many thanks go out to Rachel McCarthy who accompanied the boys. Both Ryan and Flynn are keen to attend again next year and encourage other St Mary's Indigenous secondary students to consider this great day out in 2023. Congratulations to Flynn and Ryan for making us proud, representing St Mary's.... 2 future leaders.

Health Centre News



Hello from the Health Centre,

We've made some changes this term which has brightened the area. The students comment positively everyday which is really pleasing. We have brightly coloured bean bags and have redirected the traffic to the office. This has provided students with a comfy and quiet space to rest.

It smells good too with subtle aromatherapy delivered via a humidifier. There are Puzzle books to occupy minds.....I still can't find Wally!! so often some laughter too. If you have any concerns or suggestions, please let me know. My intention is to make this space functional however as pleasant and comforting as it can be when you're feeling unwell. We've had 872 students through our doors this term which averages 22 per day: needless to say, it's a very busy space.

Covid 19 is finally declining with the warmer weather. A reminder if your child has any Flu like symptoms or feels mildly unwell: Please attend a RAT test prior to coming to school on the day so we can tick that box off. Current Dept of Health and Human resources' regulations is, if positive, isolate for 5 days. We have plentiful supply of RAT's: you can access through the Office, Health Centre or via an email. Happy to pop in your child's bag.

Spring has sprung and allergies and hay fever has hit already. If you would like us to administer any antihistamines during the day (eye drops, nasal sprays), please pop them into the Health Centre and we can assist you with the required documents. Spring is also a good reminder to review your child's Allergy Plan and that the details remain current. Kids keep growing so the doses may need to be adjusted.

We have Air purifiers in all classrooms, and they will assist circulating and cleaning the air of allergens, in addition to diluting Covid 19.

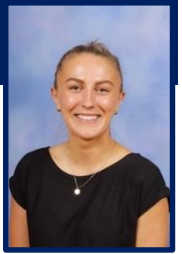
Medication authority forms are required legally for us to administer any medications at school. We can provide a soft copy for your convenience via nurse@smseymour.catholic.edu.au or pop in.

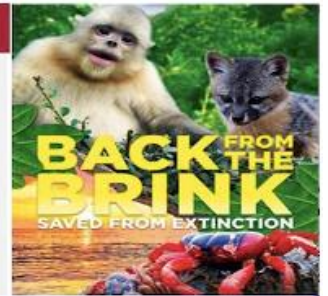
