each day of the week. Why the crisis and why is alarming data suggesting that in the next 5 years, 30% of current teachers will leave teaching? Current research has a common thread as to why teachers are leaving such an important career – excessive paperwork; lack of parent support if a behaviour issue arises and out of work time consumed with preparation.

I know of very few teachers who do not spend time in the holidays and on weeknights working to ensure they are adjusting their teaching programs for their classes. St Mary's staff are dedicated to their students. I observe it day in and day out and they go above and beyond for the common good of the children and teenagers in their care. If the truth be known most staff in schools struggle with life balance. It is in the DNA to be at the ready and thinking of what needs to be done so that students improve their learning outcomes. At St Mary's as a staff, we discuss the importance of life balance and have begun this conversation by ensuring that in the evening staff switch off from workplace emails. The future appointment of a NCCD Assistant will assist in taking some of the administrative workload off teachers by not devaluing the importance of a teacher's role in developing a student's PLP and at the same time value adding to the teacher focusing on the core business - teaching.

Catholic education believes in the importance of school and parent(s) partnerships. Parents are the first educators of their children. It is parents who set the standards of values, behaviours and moral code for their children to live by. Thank you for the support you give to our teachers at St Mary's. When issues arise and when the partnership works together – the child benefits well beyond their years at St Mary's. Rowing a boat in the same direction crosses many a rough wave.

Considering the shortage of teachers in schools and juggling classes, our students are settled and learning and teaching is our focus. The older students are excited about the return to Year 12 and are realising that the final two years of education is serious business, and they will learn very quickly if not already (as they move closer to the VCE) the metaphor from St Paul, 'you reap what you sow.'

Great teachers change lives and make the world a better place now and into the future.

School and parent partnerships is where it all begins.

The following article is by St Mary's parent and our College Vice Chairperson Kelda Gilmore. It appeared in the Herald Sunday 2nd April.

Parents need to value teachers, working with them as partners.

From textbooks to tablets, chalkboards to online classes and apps, education has undoubtedly changed over time. But one thing that hasn't changed is the power of great teachers.

Great teachers help children to thrive in so many ways. They not only provide learning opportunities for them to reach their full potential but guide them towards a future as adults who make a difference in their communities. As a mother of two boys in years 4 and 6, I have seen great teachers in action at my children's school, St Mary's Seymour, in regional Victoria.

During Covid home-schooling, my son's teacher, Mrs Brock went above and beyond to ensure we (students and parents) were always supported. She has a way of connecting our family to school life, creating a nurturing space for us all to feel welcomed in the College community and engaged in our children's learning. Teachers like Mrs Brock are worth their weight in gold.

That's why I have been alarmed by reports of heavy workloads, high stress levels and other challenges causing too many educators to leave. Our children deserve to have great teachers. So how can we as parents better support teachers and all they do for our children? How can we reassure them that they are respected and valued?

The first thing we can do is to support our teachers is working in partnership.

At St Mary's, parents are encouraged to share knowledge about their children, including what's happening in their lives. Not only does this help teachers, but there is five decades of evidence suggesting it leads to children being happier at school and improving academically, emotionally and socially. Parents can also support teachers by demonstrating and encouraging respect for them.

Our role as parents is to lead by example. When we show respect for our children's teachers, our children are more likely to follow our lead. This creates an environment in which our children will be able to fully flourish as learners, which is what we all want for our children.

I'm sure other parents would have great ideas about how to support and encourage our teachers. Let's start a conversation about creating positive change for teachers to show them how valued they are. This will ultimately benefit children and their experiences at school. Library News

It's been a very busy Term 1 in the Library for Linda and I as we take up the very welcome invitation to make our College Library 'fit' for St Mary's College return to Year 11 & 12 in 2024-25. Here are some of our Term 1 highlights and a taste of the exciting events to come.

The Library has 'expanded', using the space more effectively, to create 3 distinct zones, allowing multiple classes to use the Library simultaneously. Now that each class in the College has an assigned Library period per cycle, we needed spaces designed for teaching or 'quieter' reading. This also allowed us to design a space where the resources purchased specifically for the Secondaries and 'Senior' students could be displayed, accessed and read. There's plenty of reading and relaxing on the bean bags and lounges in these areas.

We've recruited a team of Library Helpers to assist us on the Loans Desk (supervised) to help in busy borrowing times during classes and Lunchtimes. We're also adding more screens for students to be more self directed in searching for their own material.



The College's Literacy Leader Kerrie Pearce is promoting a DEAR (Drop Everything And Read) strategy for 10 minutes reading at the beginning of each English period, so we've bulked up our range of very popular graphic novels. We've also added new titles to fiction and our focus for this year will be to expand our Senior Fiction range to support the Years 11 and 12s. A new range of resources - magazines and newspapers to meet the needs of students who prefer to read in a shorter form, and E-books will become available soon.

During Lunch times between 40-60 students from every year level visit the Library. Board games, especially Chess, are extremely popular. There are usually half a dozen tournaments contested simultaneously with primary students taking on secondary students proving that Chess has no gender or age boundaries. We hope to host a competitive Chess Tournament for contestants and spectators as we enter the colder winter months.

The whole range of games - Battleships, Checkers, Jenga, Uno, Dominoes, as well as Lego, building block towers, cars and racetracks, and a range of toys continue to engage the kids seeking less 'active' time during their long break. On Fridays we offer supervised 'Computer Time' for students to draw/trace or play approved games. We monitor the social interaction of the students to encourage good online habits and so far, it's all been positive.

Since we are on holidays soon and clearing up and cleaning out, WE ARE HAVING A LIBRARY APPEAL! We are appealing for YOUR CAST-OFFS: any books/magazines, complete Board Games, toys (in good and usable condition) to supplement the stock we have on offer coming into Winter. The less money that we spend on recreational material, the more money we can spend on the more expensive stock like non-fiction, hardcover books and magazine subscriptions. If we can't use it we will pass it on to Vinnies.

Finally, make sure that your child takes a book or two home for the holidays and that they return anything they have forgotten to return - there is always another borrower waiting!

Top Recycling Tip

Did you know Easter egg foil wrappers are recyclable!? They're too small and light to recycle on their own, but in a big ball (at least the size of a golf ball), you can recycle them in your yellow-lidded recycling bin. Collect your foil wrappers and scrunch them into a ball. Get the whole family involved and see who can make the biggest foil ball this long weekend!

Easter egg foil is made from aluminium which is a valuable recyclable. Approximately 75% of aluminium ever produced is still in use today as it can be recycled endlessly without compromising any of its unique properties or quality. Aluminium's lifecycle provides significant benefits through recycling, saving 95% of the energy it would take to make new aluminium metal – So don't let those small pieces of precious metals go to waste!
