
"When is St Mary's going to have Year 11 & 12?"

- First F-12 Pathway Committee Meeting 11th May 2021. Consultant Tony O'Byrne, former Principal Aquinas College Ringwood commissioned to project manage the SMC F-12 Pathway Submission.





- Term 1 2022 the St Mary's College Seymour F-12

New educational opportunities for senior secondary students in Seymour and surrounding areas

In an exciting development for Seymour and surrounding communities, St Mary's College, Seymour will soon be enrolling senior secondary students, with Year 11 commencing in 2024 and Year 12 in 2025, subject to approval from the Victorian Registration and Qualifications Authority (VRQA).

Principal Wayne Smith said 'Catholic education is flourishing in the fast growing areas of Seymour and Mitchell Shire and we're delighted to have senior secondary education returning after a 34-year absence.

'Our whole College community is excited that the high-quality, faith-based, and affordable secondary coeducation option we offer families from Foundation to Year 10 will soon be available to students in Year 11 and Year 12.

'Integral to the mission of St Mary's College, Seymour is for our students to experience the wholeness of a Catholic education through all their compulsory years of education.'

'St Mary's College welcomes students from all faith and cultural backgrounds who are supportive of the ethos of the College.'

'The College will strive to keep school fees as affordable as possible to remain accessible to local families because we believe that no child should miss out on a Catholic education because of their family's financial circumstances,' he said.

In supporting the announcement, Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools (MACS) Executive Director Mr Jim Miles said that MACS was pleased to offer the choice of a Catholic senior secondary education to families in the Seymour area and looks forward to working closely with the College, St Mary's Catholic Parish, and the wider community to deliver these new educational pathways for students.

The College is grateful for the support it has received from Mitchell Shire Council, College Advisory Council and parents and the Melbourne Archdiocese.

What is the VCE and what will it look like for us?

- The Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) is Victoria's senior secondary qualification leading to a variety of pathways.
- VCE requires students to complete a series of studies (subjects), most of which cover both Year 11 and Year 12 (units 1-4).
- To be awarded the VCE students MUST satisfactorily complete 20-24 units,
 with 3 units from the English group including a unit 3 and 4 sequence.
- In Year 11 students are assessed Unit 1 and 2 OAT's to achieve an S in the area of study.
- In Year 12 students are assessed via Unit 3 and 4 SACS, receiving a numerical score contributing to their ATAR.



What is the VCE and what will it look like for us?

- GAT and Year 12 exams moderates the initial raw score against all students in Victoria to achieve an ATAR
- Edrolo an additional study resource
- Book lists will be published at the end of Term 3
- VCE subject offering p33 *VCE 2024/25 Senior Student Handbook*
- Experienced VCE teaching team
- Smaller classes this is a huge benefit to young people moving into VCE
- Focused support we know our student's strengths and areas of challenge
- Attendance is key



What is the VCE VM and what will it look like for us?

The VCE **Vocational Major** (VM) is a flexible learning program that can be completed in a minimum of two years. It equips Victorian students with the skills needed for various pathways, such as apprenticeships, further TAFE courses, or entering the workforce directly and completing traineeships.

The VCE VM provides students greater choice and flexibility to pursue their own personal strengths, interests and develop the skills and capabilities needed to succeed in further education, work and life.

The VCE Vocational Major (VM) prepares students empowering them to be able to make informed decisions about the next stages of their lives through real-life workplace experiences.



What is the VCE VM and what will it look like for us?

By completing the VCE VM course, students fulfill the requirements of the VCE. They are recognised with the title of 'Vocational Major' on their Victorian Certificate of Education and **do receive** a Statement of Results.

Successful completion of VET units leads to additional statement of attainment or certificate from the Registered Training Organisation. ie. GoTafe

Unlike other VCE studies, VCE VM Unit 3-4 sequences do not have external assessments or study scores.

Note here: VCE VM studies do not contribute to the ATAR.



What is the VCE VM and what will it look like for us?

To receive the VCE **Vocational Major** (VM) students must satisfactorily complete a minimum of 16 units, over two years including:

- 3 VCE VM Literacy units (including a Unit 3–4 sequence)
- 2 VCE VM Numeracy units
- 2 VCE VM Work Related Skills units
- 2 VCE VM Personal Development Skills units
- 2 VET credits at Certificate II level or above (180 nominal hours)
- Students complete a work experience program related to their VET, for Structured Workplace Learning credit
- Students attend school 3 or 4 days per week
- Students must attend VET 1 day per week



VCE Pathways and Options - VET

VET - Vocational Education and Training

VET courses can be completed as part of a student's school studies.

VCE VET courses are nationally recognised certificates that contribute to the completion of the VCE and the VCE VM. These are offered at other schools in the surrounding community and Tafe providers both locally, in Shepparton, Melbourne and surrounding suburbs.

VCE Pathways and Options - SBAT

SBAT - School-based Apprenticeships and Traineeships.

A School-based Apprenticeship arrangement combines paid employment, one day per week as an apprentice or trainee, **plus** off-the-job vocational training (trade school or TAFE) and secondary school studies. Students must be very organised and will have a large workload both on and off the job.

It is the student's responsibility to find a suitable employer.



VCE Pathways and Options - VET & SBAT

There are a wide variety of VET and SBAT courses available.

If a student chooses a VET or a SBAT they will be off campus every Wednesday. Therefore, students will be responsible for catching up on any missed school curriculum on that day.

If a student is interested in one of these pathways, they will be interviewed for suitability. These options require a high level of organisation and dedication. Students that don't demonstrate these skills may not be accepted to participate.



VCE can be the most stressful period of school that your child will undertake. Even the most capable student can feel overwhelmed from time-to-time.

At St Mary's College, positive relationships and open communication between students, teachers and parents are valued. This is even more important for the young people in our care, as they navigate the demands of VCE.



The College's concern for the wellbeing of our students is also reflected through our Pastoral Care Program, House Mentor System, and the appointment of a school counsellor and two nurses who are available to students and, where appropriate, to parents.

All Teachers in the College will continue to:

- form positive relationships with VCE students
- promote student voice and agency
- hold high expectations for all students
- create a safe, welcoming and inclusive classroom



It takes a village to raise a child and it takes a whole learning community approach to see positive results in the wellbeing of children and young people. In addition to school and homework, it is important to remember that young people still need to have a life outside of school that is balanced. Balancing studies with dedicated rest time, connecting socially with peers, exercise and getting enough sleep, can mean the difference between having a healthy, positive year, and burning out early.



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Despite the growing influence on teenagers of social media, friends and celebrities, research continues to show that the best predictor of a young person's wellbeing is their relationship with their parents. So, as your young person navigates the demands of VCE remember that as parents or carers, you provide a model for how your children deals with difficult situations.

Ask yourself, how do you cope with stress? What you are teaching your teenager?



The VCE uniform plays an important role in creating a sense of identity amongst VCE students and the community.

The uniform has been designed by students and offers a range of options to ensure comfort in all conditions, inclusivity, choice, durability and value for money.

All students attending St Mary's College are expected to wear the uniform. All items, with the exception of shoes, must be purchased from Outback, the official uniform supplier for the school.



Next Steps?

So, where to from here?

- All Year 10 students received a VCE Handbook at the end of Term 2.
- The handbook contains course and subject information for VCE, VCE VM, VET and SBAT, frequently asked questions and a subject planner sheet.
- Students are in the process of deciding on their pathways (VCE / VM/ VET)
 and should be having discussions with parents / carers, myself, subject
 teachers, HMG teachers and Mrs Oakley about possible (realistic) selections
 and possible pathways.
- Students had the opportunity to ask questions in an information session earlier today with teachers.



Next Steps?

So, where to from here?

- Subject Selections will take place on Monday 24th July from 2pm 6pm.
- Year 10 classes will finish at lunchtime (1.25pm)
- Students may leave or a supervised study room will be open for those students who travel home via bus or cannot get picked up early
- All Year 10 students and a parent / carer will be required to attend an appointment <u>at school</u> to complete the Subject Selection process with an allocated member of staff.
- Families will be able to book their appointment via SIMON as of tomorrow (Friday)



Next Steps?

So, where to from here?

- Students who do not attend on the 24th may not get their first preferences
- Following subject selections, subject offerings, class sizes etc will be determined
- If there are any clashes or subjects unable to run, students may be asked to select an alternative and this is why they select an 8th Study Option as their back up
- Students will have until early Term One, 2024 to change a subject or program but strict cut off dates apply for subject selections and changes
- HEADSTART program will run in the final week of November
