Saint Mary of the Cross

Friday 8th August was the Feast Day of **St Mary Mackillop of the Cross,** Australia's first Saint. Mary understood very well cynicism and negativity when she was faced with opposition from those who tried to place restraints on her taking Catholic education to rural areas when she formed Australia's first Religious Order in 1868, the Sisters of St. Joseph. To her credit Mary was steadfast in her beliefs for the children she cared for and her loyalty to Catholic education is unsurpassed through her work and the legacy she left in rural Australia.



Mary Mackillop was an exceptional person, and the Mary Mackillop

Museum in Penola SA is well worth the visit. Without the desire, the dogged determination of women like Mary Mackillop, rural Australia would have had only a sprinkle of Catholic Schools from state to state. It was the remarkable and courageous Sisters of St. Joseph who started the Motor Mission where they would drive to country towns and to the far outback who like my wife's Aunty (Sr Christina) lived on sheep stations and in remote towns to provide a Catholic education for families.

The Sisters of St Joseph like the Sisters of Mercy understood their mission and more importantly walked in the footsteps of Christ. Their legacy is our responsibility. At St Mary's we take their legacy seriously in preparing young people for their future lives.

The legacy of the Mercy nuns is embedded in our St Mary's College values:

Perhaps all six values can be summed up in one word, *kindness*. Our students know that one kind act can change a day or even perhaps someone's life for the better. Kindness costs nothing but a monetary price cannot be put on the benefits of kindness or the legacy it leaves. Saint Mary Mackillop of the Cross and Venerable (process to sainthood) Catherine McAuley were two great and outstanding women. Their courage and kindness ensured Catholic education has a deserving presence in the fabric of Australian life, particularly in the country towns where Mercy Hospitals and Catholic schools were staffed and led by the nuns. They were both proud and committed disciples of Christ.

Strategic Planning and Enrolment Growth

Enrolments are increasing at St Mary's. Back in 2019/2020 MACS modelling suggested that the secondary will increase to 313 students by 2041. At the present time 2024 for secondary will begin with 290 students and when Year 12 begins in 2025 this growth will continue to increase. In 2019 St Mary's College was 390 students. In 2024 the College will be closer to 570 students. It requires a village to build a school and educate students in the Catholic Christian tradition. It takes the sum of the whole to ensure our College develops and moves forward.

At the rate of increase waiting lists will need to be considered to cope with the growing enrolment demand. Growth requires development and the following four areas are ongoing, requiring many hours of planning and meetings.

Master Planning

All MACS schools are required to have a Master Plan and is essential when applying for capital works funding. A four-stage plan has been developed. ROAM Architects completed the Master Plan Framework in 2022 in conjunction with the building of the new Primary Learning Centre (PLC).

Stage 0 will add a primary classroom to the current primary block and three meeting rooms to the Administration Centre. Further expansion will be required on the Administration Centre building as the College size increases. The successful tender for Stage 0 will be announced before the end of Term Three with work planned to begin in Term Four.

Stage 1

In March 2023 the College applied for a major building development through the *Australian Government Capital Grants Program (CGP)* – the construction of a VCE and Senior Learning Centre to extend on from the College Hall. This grant application is a significant project that will ensure VCE students have a well-resourced centre for the contemporary learning needs of senior education. The College will receive notification of the success of our Stage 1 application during Term Four.

Stage 2

The College will soon begin the process to apply to the *Victorian Non-Government Schools Capital Funding Program (VNGSCF)*. Stage 2 follows Stage 1 and is to demolish the secondary building and in its place build a



state-of-the-art double story Secondary Learning Centre.

Like most things in life, it requires money hence Stage 1 and 2 are dependent on government funding grants and there are no guarantees. Both Stage 1 and Stage 2 applications will be judged by committees on the merit of the applications within set criteria. Stage 0 is a College self-funded project.



Positive Behaviour For Learning

At St Mary's College we are continuing to refresh our Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) across all year levels. Within the PBL framework there is an understanding that we cannot assume that:



- students will not learn appropriate behaviour's quickly and effectively without <u>consistent practice</u> and <u>modelling</u>.

Therefore, we need to explicitly teach expectations and appropriate behaviour as explicitly as we teach academic skills. Research says that for a student to learn something new, it needs to be repeated on average 8 times.

For a student to unlearn an old behaviour and replace it with a new one it needs to be repeated on average 28 times. When PBL is implemented well, teachers and students have more time to focus on relationships and classroom instruction.

Routines are a behaviour prevention strategy to allow for calmer classrooms. All classrooms at St Mary's College have the same routines for lining up, entering classrooms, exiting classrooms outside and moving around the school. The routines are presented on slides and are displayed on a PBL wall within the classroom.

Staff are continuing to encourage students to show the **College values** of <u>Respect</u>, <u>Excellence</u>, and <u>Integrity</u>. These values have been used to create PBL Behaviour Matrix which is also displayed in classrooms.

The Behaviour Matrix has the three school values listed down the side, with areas in the school and how students can demonstrate positive behaviour in these places. Behaviours are explicitly taught through social stories and repetition.

Each fortnight for the term, a value along with a behaviour that demonstrates the value, is being recognized through an acknowledgement ticket system.

Students are acknowledged by a staff member who:-

1. States the value

2. States the expected Behaviour (from the Matrix) then hands the student an acknowledgement ticket.

Tickets are then posted in the PBL letter boxes. Three acknowledgement tickets are drawn F-2 and 3-6 and four are drawn from 7-10. These students then choose a lunch item and drink from the canteen.

Year 10 Melbourne Holocaust Museum Excursion

On Friday 28th July the Year 10's went on an excursion to the Jewish Holocaust Museum in Melbourne. We were first taken into a briefing room where we spoke to one of the workers, Simon, about what we already know about the Holocaust. We went into detail about key dates, places and people involved in this event. We were then guided through to the downstairs part of the building to a room where we looked at different artefacts from that time. We all sat in different groups at different tables and looked at different artefacts and had to work out whether they were an example of propaganda, anti-Semitism, resistance, starvation and other key terms.


Afterwards, we were taken back upstairs, into the same briefing room and we were lucky enough to speak to a survivor of the Holocaust. His name is Andy Factor and he is 99 years old. We all asked him questions about where he was from, why he came to Australia, and how it felt for him during that time. Year 8 & Year 9 Science

In the **Year 8 Biology unit**, students are using and learning about the microscope, preparing slides for viewing, and examining various types of cells that make up living organisms. They are investigating the similarities and differences between plant and animal cells, learning about the various organelles and their functions within the cell.

Here are some pictures taken through the lenses of the microscope of an **elodea leaf** and **red onion**, along with the some 'shrinky-cell' **key chain** made by students.






Year 9 students are learning about **homeostasis** – the maintenance of a constant internal environment despite changes to the external environment, and both the nervous and endocrine systems as methods body uses to communicate and coordinate the body as it responds to various stimuli. Students have been looking at the similarities and differences between these systems as well as positive and negative feedback

mechanisms. They are studying the effects of hormones on various glands, the transmission of signals through nerves, neurotransmitters, effects of toxins and what happens when things can go awry.

Here are a couple of snaps of the students in action – trying to maintain Homer's fluid, glucose, and temperature levels as part of homeostasis or Homer-ostasis as it may be, and students modelling the brain and learning about the various lobes of the brain.
